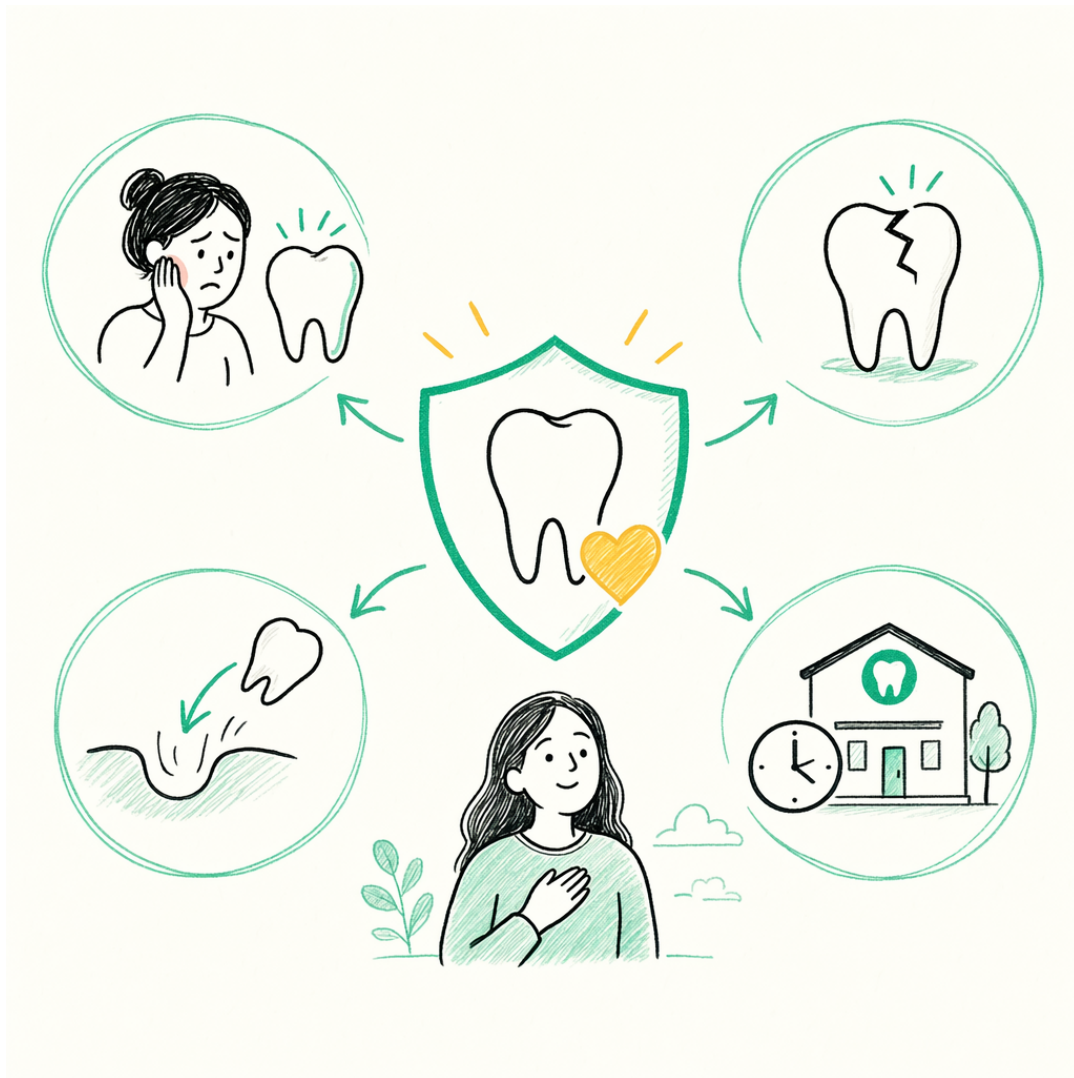


Emergency Dental Cost Guide

What this guide covers

The Emergency Dental Cost Guide explains the kinds of costs people may see for urgent dental care in the United States. It is written in plain English and meant to reduce confusion, not to replace a dentist's estimate.

Inside, you'll find a simple overview of common emergency visits, how costs can change by city and state, and why prices vary from one office to another. It also explains why dental coverage rules differ, especially for people moving between states or using a new insurance plan.

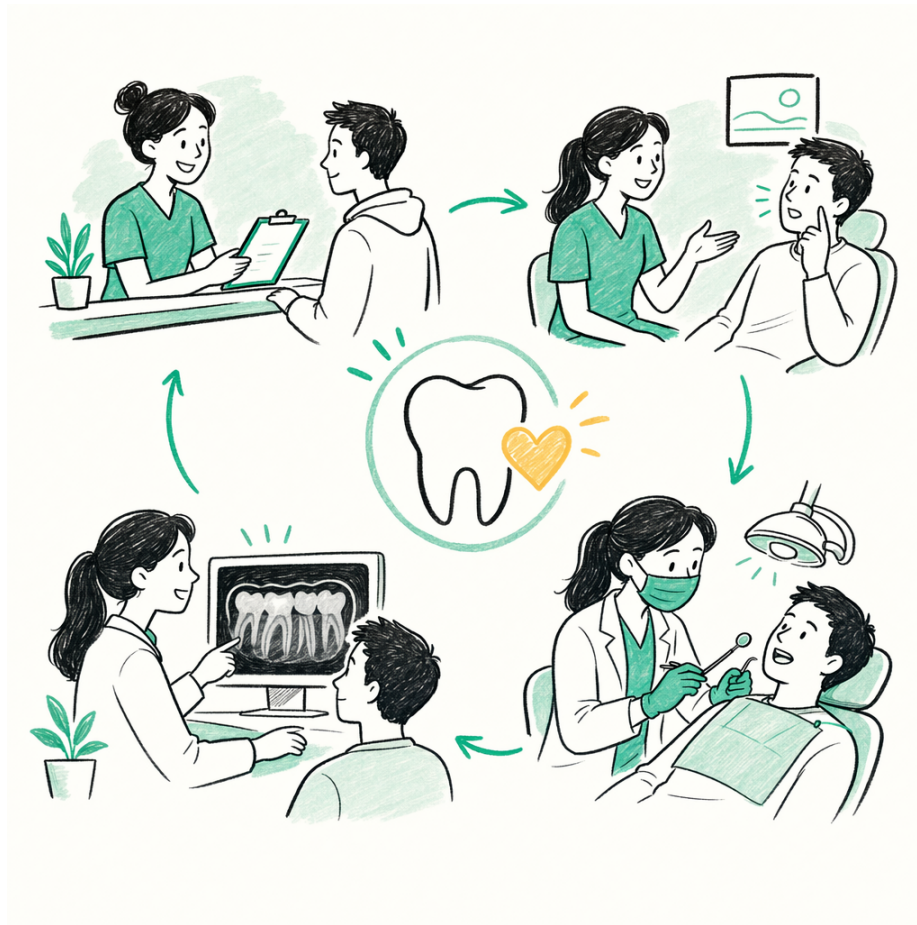

How to use it

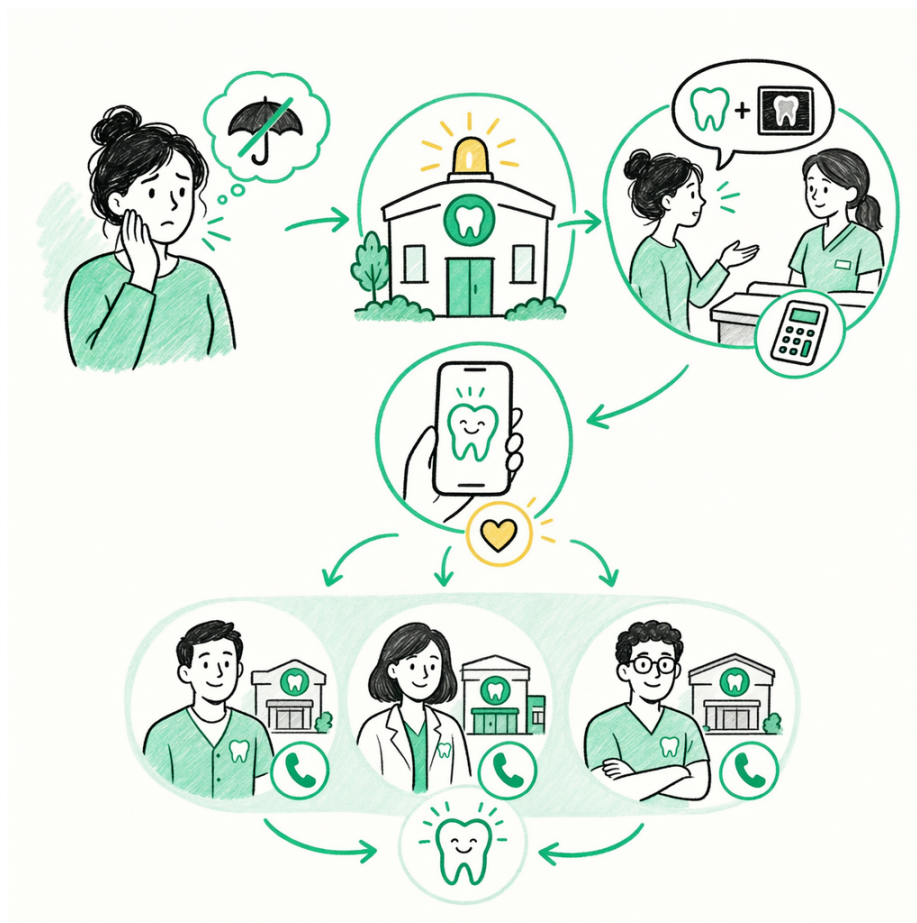
1. Read the guide first if you have a few minutes. Skim the sections that match your situation.

What kinds of costs are included

The guide talks about common cost items people may hear about during an emergency visit. That may include an exam, X-rays, a temporary fix, pain-related treatment, or follow-up care.

It also explains that the total cost can depend on the dentist, the type of problem, the city, and whether the office is open after hours. If you have insurance, your share may still vary based on your plan and the rules in your state.

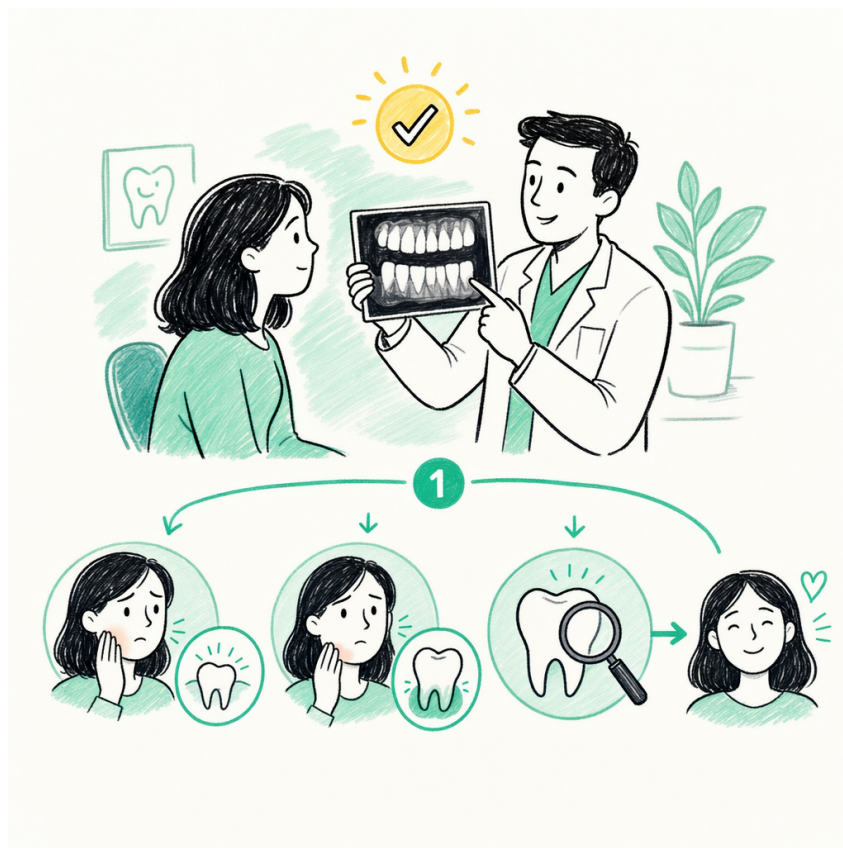


Ways people may pay

The guide gives a general overview of common ways people pay for emergency dental care. That can include insurance, cash pay, payment plans, or other office-specific options.

It also reminds readers that not every office offers the same choices, and rules can vary by state. If you need care right away, it can help to ask about payment before you arrive.

If you are comparing options, keep your focus on safety first. If you have trouble breathing or swallowing, swelling spreading toward the eye or neck, or uncontrolled bleeding, go to the ER or call 911 instead of waiting for a dental visit.
